

Donations go to the Foodbank

South Ayrshire Foodbank

The foodbank started in 2012 at New Life Church, Prestwick. It grew very quickly and in 2013 a hub was opened in Troon Old Parish Church, staffed by members of all the town churches. We now cover the whole of South Ayrshire. There is a warehouse in Prestwick which gathers and organises donated foods to distribute to all the hubs.

The Troon hub is now in St Meddan's halls and is open Tuesday and Friday from 12.00 till 2.00pm.

Donations can be handed in at those times or when the church office is open – Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday between 10.00 and 1.00pm. We also have collections at Harvest Thanksgiving and every Communion Sunday. Foods require to be long-life in tins or packets. They are packed into boxes and bags to provide an emergency three-day supply. We also try to give toiletries and washing up liquid and detergent.

We thank you all for your continued support in helping us to help those in our community.

Dear friends,

It seems no time at all since the Troon Church of Scotland came into being, and it seems even less so since I became your minister in May this year. When I first came to Troon in August 2022 to keep an eye on two congregations, I had no inkling that I would remain in this beautiful town, and I have thoroughly enjoyed getting to know so many of you.

There has been such rapid change in the last three years, that it is rather tricky keeping abreast of all that is happening in our church family: it is my hope that this magazine allows us to take stock of what we are doing and gives us a chance to assess what we are still to achieve.

For all who are able to come along to church in person, our Sunday worship services remain very well attended, but we are very fortunate to have so many volunteers who enable us to livestream each week. The services that we hold in supported living accommodation across Troon continue to be popular, and are a great way for those unable to attend church to still be active in the congregation. Likewise, our thriving midweek services offer a shorter informal service and the chance to catch up over a cup of tea and a biscuit. We are engaging well with some of the young families through our very successful Messy Church, and the Story and Song sessions hosted in partnership with St Ninian's Episcopal Church. Yet we recognise that there are areas of engagement in the community that we need to focus on in the future, to ensure that all are welcomed into our community of faith.

In Psalm 122, we read a song of ascent, understood to have been sung by the Jewish people as they approached their place of worship centuries ago:

I was glad when they said to me, 'Let us go to the house of the Lord!'

Our feet are standing within your gates, O Jerusalem.

Pray for the peace of Jerusalem: 'May they prosper who love you.

Peace be within your walls, and security within your towers.'

For the sake of my relatives and friends I will say, 'Peace be within you.'


For the sake of the house of the Lord our God, I will seek your good.

A Troon Church of Scotland Initiative

It has been a busy few weeks at Moses Basket. Generous donations of baby toiletries and the sewing skills of members of the congregation in the making of tote bags has meant we have been able to donate a good number of bags to various organisations: the Salvation Army, Babes and Toddlers, Muirhead Tenants and Residents Association, Women's Aid Ayr; Crosshouse Hospital Maternity Unit and NHS South Ayrshire Health Visiting Team.

The feedback has been very encouraging, especially so in a recent visit, when members of the Health Visiting Team said they were "over the moon" to be receiving the tote bags. What they told us made for very sad listening. Some of their clients are very young vulnerable girls who come from families with very little and who are struggling to cope. Even with various agencies involved there can still be gaps in support and they assured us that the tote bags fill a gap.

We use the resource, Spill the Beans, which Gillean follows each week. We can have up to ten children each Sunday, aged from 4 to 12 years which can prove a challenge

Five leaders, Rosalind Bruce, Katy Godden, Carolyn Jamieson, Audrey Robertson and Jane Potts, and a group of helpers share a rota, so that each week there is one leader and a helper. We have recently been delighted to welcome two new volunteers.

We are indebted to all who help. One real joy has been that we have got to know each other better.

Working together we are a real team, and we gain as much from the children as they do from us.

Going Forward

We have advertised for a Children, Youth and Families worker who would be a very welcome dynamic addition to the pastoral team. The small numbers of children at church is a nationwide problem so we should nurture our children and make them an integral part of our church family.

Messy Church continues to thrive, making church a welcome and relevant place for children and families.

We currently do not provide for older children and teenagers in Troon Church of Scotland. We are encouraged however that some of our young people attend a local Youth fellowship and Bible study. We are very conscious of the healthy state of the Girls' Brigade and the Boys' Brigade and of Gillean's involvement in schools. Gillean also runs a "Story and Song" for young children ,making the presence of the church known in the community among young people.

From the Session Clerks

Session Clerks get all the fun jobs to do...

Well, maybe not always "fun", but the job certainly has its moments, and provides a unique perspective of congregational life. Here are just a few highlights of the past year.

Evolution

As a congregation, Troon Church of Scotland is a new-born. Born on the 1st of July 2024 and only just past our first birthday. It's easy to forget, and unthinkingly revert to the familiar norms of our respective legacy congregations. Together we have achieved so much in a short time; developing a truly shared culture will take effort for a bit longer. Our evolution continues.

Ministry Team, Part 1

For various reasons, Troon Church of Scotland will have a Ministry Team. Back last September, the congregation elected a group of 13 people – the Nominating Committee – to find two new ministers of equal standing, simultaneously. They worked extremely hard but could not make this untried idea work. They did however identify one suitable Minister for the congregation. Fast forward a few months and on the 8th of May 2025, the Rev Gillean Richmond was inducted as Minister of Word and Sacrament for Troon Church of Scotland. We are very grateful to the members of the Nominating Committee for all their hard work and equally grateful to Gillean for accepting our call.

Buildings

Perhaps the most unenviable task facing the Kirk Session has been the closure and selling of our Troon Old premises. This iconic building in its central location has long served the community of Troon, and it is encouraging to see a community group making a serious attempt to buy it and keep it as a community asset. We wish them success.

Under church law, the sales process is conducted by the General Trustees of the Church of Scotland. Meanwhile we, as a congregation, are responsible for looking after Troon Old premises until a sale is agreed. How long will this take? We cannot answer with any certainty, but we hope progress will be made by early next year.

On the domestic front, we continue to actively seek the best possible accommodation for our ministers – remember we are still allocated two ministers by Presbytery. A committee of the Kirk Session has worked very

hard and secured the purchase of a new-build house in Troon, as well as selling the former St Meddan's manse. Options for the remaining Portland and Troon Old manses are being studied with a view to renovate/sell.

Our objective is to have two manses suitable for two ministers and their families. This will take time.


Ministry Team, Part 2

With Gillean now officially in post, we need to turn our attention to the rest of the Ministry Team. The shape of the team may have to be tweaked given the Nominating Committee's experience, and our evolving understanding of our Local Mission Plan. We still expect to recruit a second full-time minister to join Gillean, soon. We are also currently re-advertising for a Youth, Children and Families Worker and are hopeful that we will attract suitable applicants. Finally, Presbytery has appointed an OLM (Ordained Local Minister) to join the team but with the shortage of ministers and so many local vacant charges needing pulpit cover, our OLM continues to be deployed elsewhere. Watch this space.

Next Steps

Where do we go next? The Kirk Session is planning a Saturday conference about **Mission**, **Ministry and Worship**, in the coming weeks. These topics are the priority for the Kirk Session as we look to the future and, among other things, the conference will explore how we plan to complete our ministry team, the pattern of worship we wish to develop, and the properly resourced spaces we need to accommodate that worship.

We continue in hope and faith knowing that God has a plan for us.
